Suicide or Survive (SOS)

Suicide or Survive (SOS) was established in 2005 by Caroline McGuigan, CEO, and she and her team work tirelessly to raise awareness of mental health issues in Ireland. SOS is dedicated to working towards the eradication of death by suicide, devoted to educating all generations in matters related to mental health wellness, committed to being a living and caring contact point where people who are at their most vulnerable will feel cherished and listened to, and passionate about removing the stigma associated with mental health challenges.

SOS is an active partner of **See Change** - Ireland's national partnership to reduce stigma and challenge discrimination associated with mental health problems. See Change is an alliance of organisations including the Health Service Executive, Government Departments, non-statutory agencies, service users and carers and other stakeholders – all working together through the National Stigma Reduction Partnership to bring about positive change in public attitudes and behaviour towards people with mental health problems.

In June 2010, SOS ran a pilot programme of 'Wellness Workshops'. These workshops were developed by drawing on the organisation's unique experience and expertise in the corporate, community and voluntary sectors. Each one-day workshop offers participants an array of practical tools, understandable theory and workable solutions to help them maintain their mental wellness in both their personal and professional lives.

The success of the "Wellness Workshops" led to the Vodafone Ireland Foundation joining with SOS as a strategic partner. Places at the "Wellness Workshop" are normally €200 per delegate but they are being offered **free of charge** thanks to the support of Vodafone Ireland Foundation and a full programme has been rolling out across the nation since November, 2010. To date, SOS have held over 22 workshops across the nation, with an average attendance of 30 people at each event. This has created almost 500

Ambassadors for the work that SOS is doing to break down the stigma of mental health issues and the workshops themselves are actively up-skilling our community during these challenging times.

The success of the "Wellness Workshops" has led to interest by other community groups. SOS has come together with a variety of organisations including the Samaritans, Sli Eile, Navan Lions Club, Kildare Bereavement Support Group and Darndale Belcamp Village Centre to host additional events. The cost of each event is shared with the community groups and together they can continue to offer free places at the workshop to their community.

Caroline McGuigan, CEO, SOS said, "Being able to offer help and support to people throughout Ireland with these workshops can make a real difference. They help to raise awareness of mental health issues right across the country. The difficult economic climate of the past two years has put enormous pressure on everyone and unfortunately some people find it more difficult to cope than others. We are keen to work with community groups or parent's councils or groups in any part of the country to bring the **Wellness Workshop** into their community so that we can educate and empower our nation – to put them in a position to be able to provide support to anyone who feels that they struggling."

Reaching out and providing a safe space to those who have attempted suicide or have had suicidal thought, SOS offers a longer, more intensive course called the 'Eden Programme'. It provides a supportive group environment over a 6 month period (via weekly groups) in which up to 8/10 participants per programme become more aware of their own mental health states and can develop independence in terms of confidence and communication skills, and an understanding of their options, both therapeutic and personal. This year for the very first time the National Parents' Council Post Primary member organisations (**COMPASS + CSPA + FEDCBS + NPAVSCC + PACCS = NPCpp**) have come together to host a joint conference for all parents of students in second level schools.

The conference promises to be informative, interesting and will cover a broad range of topics that affect your teenager's years in second level and on to third level. Our keynote speaker is Senator Ronan Mullen who will speak on all aspects of parental involvement in school life. There will be workshops on bullying, study skills, choice of study paths and on the many challenges pupils face. We will have representatives from various different organisations such as Frances Shearer National Co-ordinator, RSE. Support Service, Department of Education and Skills who will speak on the new Child Protection Guidelines, and the National Council for Curriculum and Assessment (NCCA) will give a presentation on future developments within the education system. Dr. Amanda Fitzgerald Postdoctoral Researcher in the Youth Mental Health School of Psychology and Dr. Barbara Dooley, PhD Senior Lecturer School of Psychology at University College Dublin in conjunction with Headstrong will present the findings of the first national study of youth mental health in Ireland. The conference will be opened on Friday evening by the Minister for Education and Skills Mr. Ruairí Quinn. He will address issues relevant to parents in the current economic climate. Another first to Ireland and NPCpp is the European Parents' Association (EPA) President Mr. Johannes Theiner who will speak on European schools and general aspects of European parents' participation in schools. MOVING UP, a new illustrated book for parents of children transferring to second-level schools will be officially launched at the Conference. The book's author is John Stevenson, a former Principal and the book has been endorsed and supported by the National Association of Principals and Deputy Principals (NAPD) and National Parents' Council Post-Primary.

The National Parents' Council Post Primary extends an invitation to **all** parents who have children in second level. We feel that in attending the conference, parents will benefit in many different ways from the information gleaned over the weekend. It is a forum for gathering information but also for sharing. We would encourage you and other parents of children at second level to join us for this weekend.

Schools sign up to Young Social Innovators!

Does your teenager’s school participate in Young Social Innovators (YSI)? If so, he/she has a unique chance to be one of over 6,000 young people each year who undertake substantial civic action projects in their communities. Some 350 schools take part in YSI and it is open to all second level schools in Ireland.

YSI is promoting essential learning for life and work. It encourages young people to be innovative around social issues and need. Teenagers aged between 15-18 yrs can take part in its Social Innovation programme over the course of the year. This involves working in a team, exploring a social issue of concern, coming up with an innovative action in response to this and attending the regional YSI Speak Out forum and the national Showcase. There are also opportunities to get help through the YSI Den and other initiatives. There is a small participation fee but no one is excluded if unable to pay. (YSI is a not for profit company with charitable status).

Why is YSI relevant? YSI is ten years old this year and has given us plenty of reason to reflect on its relevance and importance in Ireland. Over 35,000 teenagers have taken part. YSI helps young people to take part in their community in meaningful ways and in so doing, find their own identity and strengths. Personally, I think when young people say after doing their YSI project, as many do, that they feel they have made a difference, that this is the real measure of YSI’s success. Knowing that I make a difference and that my life can make a difference to others is the great learning and is why YSI is so important to young people and also why they enjoy it so much.

There is a lot of focus today on how we educate young people to be innovative and creative thinkers and doers and on educating for life as well as work. YSI demonstrates how this can be done with the common good in mind.

If your school wants to take part, it just needs to apply. Resources, training and support are given to schools as part of the programme.
